Story of a trainee

When our trainee was 6 years old, her father sent her away to another family. Thinking she was going on vacation, our trainee went happily, only to find that she was sent there to work as a child laborer: to cook, clean, and take care of the kids in this new family.

The work conditions were extremely difficult and the family continuously mistreated her. For years, she had no one to go to for support. Many times she tried to run away, only to be sent back by her father to work again. Finally, she decided to run away and never return home.

This trainee went from city to city all over Morocco, living on the streets, trying to find odd jobs here and there. In the spring of 2014, she gave birth to a daughter and became a single mother. With the help from a single mothers organization in Marrakech, she applied to Amal to learn skills and gain experiences in order to find a steady job so that she can become financially independent to support her baby.

Currently, this trainee is in her mid-20s, graduated Amal successfully, and has a stable job at a riad, complete with paperwork. She says that she has high hopes for her future.



Amal Women's Training Center and Moroccan Restaurant empowers women from disadvantaged backgrounds to become self-sufficient. Motivated women train in our restaurant to develop job and life skills in order to transform their lives and become economically and socially stable.

Who are our trainees?

Amal trains women from disadvantaged backgrounds such as:

- Divorced or single mothers
- Widows

Former child maids

- Orphans
- Women with little or no education

Amal Training Center

Ten women are selected every four months to participate in our intensive training program. After graduation, our trainees are placed in jobs around Marrakech.

Our training program encompasses:

- Training at the restaurant, including kitchen, pastry making, and service
- Language classes in French, English, and Arabic
- Internships with outside businesses such as riads, hotels, café, and restaurants
- Personal and group therapy with professional psychiatrist
- Life skills coaching
- Arts and crafts classes

Background

Nora Fitzgerald Belahcen, a Moroccan American, wanted to help Moroccan women in a sustainable way. In 2012 she founded Amal and in spring of 2014, Amal accepted its first class of trainees. She wanted the training center to be a way of opening windows to horizons of hope for women. That is why she named the center "Amal," which means "Hope" in Arabic.

"I see Amal as a space focused first and foremost on honoring and supporting these strong, well-deserving women who have faced incredible difficulties in their lives.

The transformation in these women's lives is quite profound. When they first arrive they rarely smile or make eye contact, even their shoulders are stooped over as if to make them smaller. As the weeks go by, they begin to smile, to stand up straight, to develop a sense of self-worth, to trust themselves and the world."
